

Who, what, when, where, why?

To be an archaeologist, you have to look at lots of objects and find clues which will tell you more about them (a bit like a detective!) A way to do this is to ask questions, such as:

Who might have used the object? When would it be used? How old is it? What else might you find nearby? What is it made from?

Archaeologists also use all of their senses when they look at an object to help them learn more about it. They might ask:

What does it feel like? Is it hard or soft? Rough or smooth? How heavy/light is the object? What does it smell like?

Fancy giving it a go? Put on your detective hat and look at these Anglo-Saxon objects below, popping your ideas in the boxes.


HANDY HINT!
